

Year One Home Learning

Maths W/C 1.6.20

Please note that this is a new area of Maths for your child in Year One since covering a small amount of time (based on language) in Reception. Your child will need support and encouragement to help them learn something new.

This week's Maths focus is all about Time. In Year One it is important that children use language to talk about time. Ordering time with the days of the week and months of the year is also important.

Your child will begin to learn about the analogue clock and how the face is made up.

Simple discussions can be had to help your child learn about the hour and how to show o'clock and half past using the hour and minute hands on the clocks face.

Your child should learn to show the o'clock and half past time on a clock face using a clock and by drawing the hands onto a blank clock face.

Time Activities for the week: (I would suggest choosing one activity a day – Enjoy!)

- Make labels on pieces of card/paper to show the **days of the week**. Encourage your child to recognise the words when reading them. Play simple games to order the days of the week. Learn a song or a rhyme to help your child say all of the days of the week in order. Your child should learn that there are **7 days in a week**.
- Make labels on pieces of card/paper to show the **months of the year**. Encourage your child to order the months of the year and recognise reading each word. Use rhymes and songs to help your child say the months of the year in order. Use your labels to play simple games.

Your child should learn there are **12 months in a year**.

- Make a daily calendar. You could use your labels to help you make a calendar so you can talk about the days of the week and months of the year regularly. Be creative!
- **Make a clock face**. You can use the template provided, or be even more creative to make a clock face of your own. Talk about the **face** of the clock. Look at the numbers and introduce the word **hour**. Talk about the clock having two hands – the **minute hand** and the **hour hand**.



- **Teach your child to tell the time with o'clock and half past**. Use your home made clocks to help you. Ask your child to show you the correct times on their clock. Make it into a little game.

- Use the blank clock faces to ask your child to **draw some o'clock and half past times** accurately.

Remember that your child can continue to practice their Mathematics online any time they like.
